Fortnite season 2 debuted at the beginning of 2020 and was a collaboration between Epic Games and Marvel. After crossovers with Avengers and Star Wars, Fortnite teamed up with Marvel’s anti-hero Deadpool. Players were able to unlock an official skin themed after the crazy merc with a mouth by completing weekly challenges. Since the season has ended, many are still wondering if you’re able to gain access to the content from it, including the Deadpool skin. Here, we’ll go into everything you’ll need to know about the Deadpool skin in Fortnite. Further reading: Can you still unlock the Deadpool skin? Unfortunately, no, you cannot gain access to the Deadpool skin in Fortnite anymore, due to the conclusion of chapter 2 season 2. With each season, the game features new challenges and themes, meaning the previous season and its contents go away. This is in attempts to keep things fresh and to ensure players keep checking back in. Season 2 ran from February 20 to June 17, 2020, and included a large variety of features, including changes to the map, a new Battle Pass, new weapons, factions, and updates to the game’s menus. It was also the season that featured the historical Travis Scott concert, which millions of players attended. The length of season 2 was extended by Epic Games, due to the COVID pandemic, and was the longest season of Fortnite, overall. To unlock the Deadpool skin, players had to complete this character’s weekly challenges, which required you to find several collectibles, like his shorts and pistols, and other tasks related to the anti-hero. To have access to the Deadpool challenges, you have to buy the Battle Pass, but it’s worth it because it also works for the game’s latest release. Along with the weekly challenges required to unlock the skin, you can also execute biweekly challenges throughout the season. Each of these challenges differs from one another and is relative to each character. There are some silly ones too. For example, one of our favorite ridiculous tasks involves finding Deadpool’s plunger and destroying toilets in a specified location. Plenty of games give you some surprising jobs, but Epic Games tries to design theirs around each character’s personality and theme. One of the coolest things about completing a challenge is that you get to unlock your character’s skin, which you can use during play. In addition, you’ll get the opportunity to select from various Deadpool-themed objects. For instance, once you finish a challenge successfully, you could gain access to a banner, a few different sprays, Deadpool equipment, a loading screen, and sometimes even multiple variations of the Deadpool costume. There’s even an additional challenge you can take on that will unlock even more rewards like the authentic red costume, an unmasked edition, and the X-force skin. Fortnite’s main focus is on Wolverine in the fourth season. His character goes through his own particular series of obstacles, similar to Deadpool’s. This season maintains the same technique of achieving character-specific endeavors that lead to you unlocking and using his skin throughout your gaming adventure. Editors’ Recommendations (Image credit: Tom’s Guide) The Fortnite Ninja skin is unlike other cosmetics in the colorful battle royale, as it marks the first time a streamer has gotten their likeness placed in-game for millions of fans to wear. It’s not unlikely that other streamers get similar recognition in the future. The skin features Ninja’s trademark blue hair, a high collared futuristic coat, and his blue and yellow logo on the side. The Ninja skin became available on January 17 for 1,500 V-Bucks, which rounds out to about \$15. The skin left the shop after it’s regular rotation on January 19, so it’s currently unavailable with no way to directly purchase or obtain the skin in-game. Fortnite developer Epic Games will most likely bring the skin back at some point like it’s done with other cosmetics, but we have no idea when that will happen. It’s limited edition so we may have to wait sometime before this returns. The Fortnite item shop updates every day at 5 pm Pacific Time, if you’re eyeing to pick up the Ninja skin you’ll want to check the shop each day. There are handy sites that help you do that, like this one, so you don’t have to log in if you aren’t at home. The Ninja skin set comes with the Ninja outfit, Ninja’s Edge Back Bling, a Ninja Emote called the ‘Pon Pon’, and the Dual Katanas Pickaxe. It’s part of an icon series that began earlier this month. The series brings personalities, including musicians, artists, and actors, to bring their likeness to the game. Major Lazer and Marshmello were both previous collaborators. YouTube creators Loserfruit and The Grefg are both future content creators that will be part of this series. Fortnite isn’t just a battle royale game — it’s a skin-selling machine. Kind of like Altered Carbon on Netflix. You buy skins and wear them.(Image credit: Epic Games)Is it morbid? Yes. But it’s also elitist, as not all skins are created equal in Fortnite. Enter the Galaxy skin, which is available only to those with a Galaxy Note 9 or Galaxy Tab S4.Should you own one of these two devices (or have a pal who’s willing to let you use their device to sign into your Fortnite account), simply log into your Fortnite account and you’ll have access to the skin. Said galaxy adjusts depending on the camera angle you view the costume at, meaning you can spend entire stretches in Fortnite just playing with yourself in a corner to see all the unique aesthetics of the premium skin.Lauded Fortnite streamer Ninja has already gotten a chance to use the skin on a live server, thanks to Samsung sending him a very special supply crate that likely required an unjustifiable amount of resources and labor to produce. You can see the skin in action in a video posted to Ninja’s YouTube channel.Forbes columnist Paul Tassi decided to call Samsung’s support team in order to deduce whether the Galaxy skin might someday become available to Fortnite players without a Note 9 or Tab S4. Though the “language barrier,” as he put it, presented a bit of an issue, it seems his detective work paid off. All hints point to the idea that the skin will become available for all Samsung users, eventually.
